USDF Nationals

Let me start with the backstory on my road to riding at the US Finals. In 2020 I had my first born son, quitting my office job to stay at home and start my path to getting back into horses full time. I had a round pen in my back yard and a couple clients I would be riding for and teaching. While on a camping trip I had seen a Facebook post from my now boss, Kate Fleming-Kuhn, looking for an assistant trainer. I had ridden with Kate and Martin in my late teens and had always followed their careers. Working for them was something I dreamt about but never thought I would be good enough to do. I mentioned the post to my husband on our weekend trip. He told me to apply. He was tired of watching me burn circles on our farm, full of nervous energy and more drive than I know what to do with most days.

In my first year and a half with Kate and Martin, I earned my USDF bronze and silver medals in record time. I had not been in the show ring for over ten years prior to starting with them. In April of 2022 I was able to earn my silver medal in one weekend on a client's horse named Madrono. Later in the summer Pinky Noll, Madrono's owner, offered me to ride in a couple clinics with Olympic medalist Cindy Ishoy. I was tickled at the opportunity. Pinky soon offered me to show Madrono in the open division at US Finals to (fingers crossed) earn my gold scores at Intermediare I. I was flabbergasted and, of course, accepted. The months leading up to Finals I was like a giddy school girl shopping for the flawless outfit and trying to execute the perfect body clip.

Another client and dear adopted barn mom, Pat McVary, offered to go with me on the long road trip as my emotional support and dedicated travel expert. She had been to Finals before and knew the layout. The entire drive had zero silence in the truck as I nervously chatted her ear off about my goals and ambitions, my hopes and dreams for the weekend. I found myself constantly glancing at her GPS as the miles ticked down to Lexington.

Pulling into the Kentucky Horse Park, I felt like I was truly in a dream. Perfectly groomed horses, numbers on their

bridles and halters, in every direction. I was absolutely in awe, and about to throw up my turkey sandwich which Pat had pre-made for our drive. (Anyone who knows me, knows it is mandatory for me to eat every two hours or I will quickly turn into the devil herself.) Once unloaded, I headed to school in the arena with Kate. At this point I was confident in knowing Madrono's quirks. We had built a special bond during our time together. I hand walked him along a black painted wood fence to three open rings with several horses already schooling. As soon as my leg swung over his back, I was in full game mode. We had an excellent school. I really felt like I was able to channel my nervous energy to work to our advantage. Every half halt came through. He was powering up underneath me.

We had a marvelous dinner with our barn family. I managed to get a good night's sleep even with my show nerves building. My ride time was 9:30 AM. I was happy to not have to wait around all day twiddling my thumbs. My normal work day usually involves riding 5-7 horses and teaching, so riding one is like a mini vacation. In this case less work also means too much energy for me. I knew the test inside and out, going over it that morning would only give me room to

question myself. I forced down some oatmeal and coffee as we chatted on our way to the Horse Park. Pat could feel the nerves pouring out of my body as I paced back and forth by the stall trying to busy myself. She came up with an excuse to leave me alone so I could get myself under control. Several trips to the bathroom and tears welling in my eyes, I put on my show clothes. I was a ball of energy that couldn't be controlled. The moment I grabbed the bridle and began to take off Madrono's halter, I started to settle. There is something so calming in the routine of the little things we do to prepare to get on, cavesson, curb chain, throatlatch, it's game time. I mounted by the stall and rode Madrono to the arena this time. Kate was already there waiting for me. I couldn't even bring myself to say good morning.

I blurted out, "I'm worried about getting the balance in the trot to keep him from running." She smiled and just started schooling me. I entered the arena with one goal, a clean test. Of course, I wanted that 60% but I had never shown at this level at a venue of such magnitude. I didn't want to disappoint myself or my barn family. It was perfect weather, 60 degrees, sunny.

The place was full of smiles and nervous competitors and horses. I rode a clean test, the trot work... we were running. The balance could have been better. There were several moments I knew he got low in the poll and the walk was lacking clarity. The canter work was my highlight, perfectly timed tempis, balanced pirouettes and hey, I did it! I looked up on the screen as I walked out smiling and panting trying to catch my breath to a 64%. I was so proud of the little white unicorn underneath me. I already knew what I needed to improve the next day.

I watched the video from my ride ad nauseum that night. Not in an overly critical way, but what can I do to bring out our best. The trot work, it was clear. Drive the hind leg under my seat bones and take off the safety susan gloves. In true Finals form, it was cold and pouring rain the next morning, far from the perfect weather we had the previous day. When I got on it was all business, I was determined to put my leg on and give that test hell. Halfway through the warm up, in a nearly empty arena, my hands were slipping on the reins from the soaking rain and sweat. Before walking up to the competition ring, I changed gloves in hope for a little extra friction. I went into the ring on fire. If it meant mistakes, I didn't care, I was going to give 100% on every stride. The trot work was much improved. I nailed the canter work for a second day in a row. The barn family, troopers that they are, all stood in the cold rain to cheer me on. I gave my final salute and knew even if the score didn't reflect improvement with a new judge, I had truly gotten better than the day before. Walking out I could hear Kate yelling and pumping her fist in the air as she drove away on the golf cart. I turned around to see 67% on the board. Bring on the tears, I couldn't believe it. The little unicorn had given me his heart in the ring, everything I asked for, he provided.

I got to spend the rest of the day soaking in our other teammates' rides, and watching Cindy Ishoy coach my biggest idols, Kate and Martin. I gloried in every word, sound and sight around me. That night Pat and I took some drinks and our dinner to watch the Grand Prix in the Alltech Arena and dream of where we all hope to

end up. While watching one beautiful horse after another, a tall black mare came into the ring showing at Intermediare II in the AA division. I couldn't take my eyes off of her sleek, modern type. Immediately I thought ,this was my kind of horse. When I looked up at the screen I noticed the horse's name, she is a half sister to my coming three-year-old Dutch filly Kate had helped me pick out as my future horse.

I have been extremely fortunate in my horse journey. My parents were both horse trainers themselves. They ran a successful breeding program and started horses to saddle. Growing up they gave me every opportunity they could to sit my fearless tail on any horse I could get my hungry hands on. When they decided to start different career paths I was heartbroken going from having 30 horses at my fingertips down to a handful at home. They dropped me off with Paula Briney, who took me under her wing for many years and got me started in the world of dressage. Through high school and college, she led me down the addicting path of dressage and its principles. She helped me with a homebred colt I had started and raised myself. I eventually showed and sold him to be able to afford two separate internships with Jan Ebeling in California.

USDF News Release on Monday, November 13, 2022

Martin Kuhn was the only man to pick up a championship title on a day otherwise filled with girl power. He piloted Ronin, his wife Kathryn Fleming-Kuhn's nine-year old gelding by Blue Hors Romanov, to 75.784% – bolstered by a high score of 77.647% from the judge at C. Ronin was bred by Marcia Boeing, and he's been with the Kuhns since he was a two-year-old. The pair shone in a strong class of 23 in which the top eight all achieved over 70%.

"He was with me every step of the way, which hasn't historically always been the case," said Kuhn, who is based out of Springfield, Illinois. "He has struggled with confidence but he's coming into his own now. I just wanted him to have the best possible experience.

"It's always fun here. There are very few shows where we get to see our friends from all over the country, and there's good camaraderie," added Kuhn, whose pre-show training paid dividends. "We were very fortunate to have [Canadian Olympian] Cindy Ishoy come to coach us, and we credit her with a lot of the successes here, as well as our long-time coach and mentor, Gerhard Politz."
